PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...some dangers in life. We get to sky dive, if we want to. We get to do something called bungee jumping, which is where we leap off a bridge with simply an elastic rope tied to our ankles. We get to ride a motorcycle, we get to eat foods that we want to eat, we get to drink liquor, we get to smoke cigarettes, pipes, and chew tobacco, because it is hard to find those bright lines as to where the risks outweigh the choice that comes with being an adult. This measure seeks to return a genuine sensible distinction. Keep free sampling away from minors, permit it for adults. It reinforces a longstanding legal distinction, and one that, by the way, is at the essence of...

PRESIDENT MOUL: Time.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...some personal freedoms, that not every action an adult takes has to be justified by some cost benefit analysis that government passes.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Time.

SENATOR LANDIS: But we get to be foolish, nonsensical, and we get to enjoy risks, if we wish to, because it is in the essence of how we choose to exercise our freedom that we find ourselves. So long as we keep...

PRESIDENT MOUL: Time.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...free samples out of the hands of minors, that's the place where we should act. And this amendment does it. We do not need to indefinitely postpone this bill.
