SENATOR LANDIS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I think in part I was maybe the only one that wanted to speak on this and I will make my remarks brief. When I look at this issue I ask myself, should the Legislature keep a nonsensical promise made by someone else? And community consent is a nonsensical commitment on two respects, but it doesn't mean that I don't think we should keep it. It's nonsensical in the sense that anybody faced with this will vote no. Every community that I can think of is likely to vote no. And, secondly, it is out of the ordinary course in which we do business. We put lots of uncomfortable, disquieting public facilities around the state, whether it's a road, whether it's a landfill, whether it's a penitentiary, whether it's a group home, and people in that area object. What we normally do is compensate. We don't use community consent, we use a form of compensation. Secondly, it's true that the Legislature didn't make this promise.
