

scheduled for next year. This is in addition to all the other appropriations. There is another aid program set up for the public institutions. And, again, we're not affecting that. That aid ought to stay there. What this does is set up a very small amount for some needy students within the state to make...to give them an additional educational alternative. The amount, as I mentioned, would increase our state aid, our average state aid to independent students from \$26 to \$59. We're not talking about an enormous amount of money. The appropriation, as Senator Moore mentioned, is 250 in the first fiscal year, and 500 in the second fiscal year. And when we talk about the enormous amounts of money we're sending to education in the other sector, in the public sector, it pales by comparison. There simply is no comparison money wise. It's a small step philosophically. Sure, it's a change, but it's a well...it's a good change. I think that's what I would urge...

SPEAKER BAACK: One minute.

SENATOR LINDSAY: ...is that the body advance LB 647. If Senator Lynch would like any of the remainder...he wouldn't, so I would just simply urge that the body advance LB 647 to Select.

SPEAKER BAACK: You've heard Senator Lindsay's closing on the advancement of LB 647. We'll now vote on the advancement. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 8 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB 647.

SPEAKER BAACK: LB 647 advances. It does not appear on your agenda, but we do have to do LB 647A.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 647A is a bill introduced by Senator Moore. (Read title.)

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Moore.

SENATOR MOORE: Yes. As Chairman of the committee, I introduced this bill, since this actually was part of our overall package. And, as mentioned, the appropriation levels in this bill are \$250,000 for the '91-92 fiscal year, and \$500,000 in the '92-93 fiscal year. I simply move for its advancement.
