SENATOR ROBAK: It's just an estimate, based on financial considerations. It's done by the Library Commission...the library directors.

SENATOR SMITH: I still don't understand how that works. And if there is anyone that can clarify that, I'd really appreciate it, because when it says expected implementation of library automation, it gives the library, then it gives the year, and the proposed local matching funds. So the implementation should be impacted as far as the year is what I'm...when they would implement the automation service, or when they would apply is what I don't understand here, and what is it contingent on? Oh, you have the answer. Okay, all right, Senator Moore.

SENATOR MOORE: It's predicated upon where the library...specific library is in their whole process. And so they're really...that is under their control, so to speak, because it's contingent upon where they are in their process. Some libraries are much closer to this than others.

SENATOR SMITH: Okay, that's...

SENATOR MOORE: There's a lot of preparatory work that has to occur before you can do this, and dependent upon where a library is, presently, and how fast they're going to move with some of their matching funds, would be predicated upon that.

SENATOR SMITH: So they have to have some things in place before they can apply is what you're saying.

SENATOR MOORE: Yes, they have to be...not being a librarian, (inaudible)...
