SENATOR ROBAK: Over four years, yes. Over four years, based on four years.

SENATOR SMITH: So it's 400 for this bi...for the next two years.

SENATOR ROBAK: Yes.

SENATOR SMITH: But, overall, once they start we're going to have to get the full 800,000 in order to get the match?

SENATOR ROBAK: Probably.

SENATOR SMITH: So, if we don't get...if we got support only for the first part, I guess I need some more information here. My understanding in talking to them is that a fourth of this money comes from the local effort, a fourth of it would come from the state, and half of it would come from the Kiewit grant.

SENATOR ROBAK: Fourth from Kiewit, half from local.

SENATOR SMITH: Hmm.

SENATOR ROBAK: Well, if...

SENATOR SMITH: I wrote this down out there, by the person that provided this information to me, so something is not straight here, and I'd like to get that straightened out.

SENATOR ROBAK: Okay.

SENATOR SMITH: But then the other thing I'd like to have straight for myself then is how, what if we don't fund this totally for the four years?

SENATOR ROBAK: Okay. If the state provides 25 percent of the funds, Kiewit would match that, so that's half of it. And then the other half goes locally.

SENATOR SMITH: This is not a total of 800,000, is it? Or is it 800,000 from the state's share for...

SENATOR ROBAK: This amendment would...

SENATOR SMITH: ...200,000 a year for four years is the state's
