

committee. This is not an easy issue. This has been a very difficult issue from the industry. It has been a difficult issue for the Department of Motor Vehicles, and there has been a lot of give and take, and a lot of work went into this bill in the last two years. The matter that Senator Moore and the Appropriations Committee brings to us is a matter of money in carrying out something that isn't particularly popular through the industry to do but it has got to be done. And if we don't do this, and I think that the committee amendments try to again strike that balance, and maybe that is a good balance because there is still people on both sides that don't like it, but it attempts to do that. I...Senator Lamb's intentions here are good, I understand where he is coming from, but I think that we stir up the process even more here with this amendment, and I would again urge you to reject the Lamb amendment to the committee amendments. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Kristensen. Senator Beyer.

SENATOR BEYER: Madam Speaker and colleagues, and this does not directly reflect to Senator Lamb's amendment, I am still undecided on it. But just a little explanation, my license, and I have it in front of me, expires 5/20 in '93. I can take my test according to the amendment that the Transportation Committee put on any time after June 1st, between then and April of '93. After September 1st, I would have to pay the \$40 fee. But also, this would, and, Senator Kristensen, I am going to ask you to verify this, if I take mine after June 1st, my license, if I understand, it should be good until 5/20 of '97?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Yes, that is right. That is an additional benefit that you are going to get because you get the second succeeding birthday for your renewal, and you would be one of the ones who would get, again, another additional benefit of this, and you'd get it for \$20.

SENATOR BEYER: Or if I take it after September 1st, it would be \$40.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Or after, it would be...but you...

SENATOR BEYER: But it still would be good until '97?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Absolutely, and that is the point that I...thank you for bringing that up. That is one I hadn't
