

clients wind up being shot through the grease by corrupt or incompetent lawyers, then when an attempt to bring a malpractice action is undertaken, if you can find a lawyer the courts tend to protect that incompetent or corrupt lawyer. You will run the risk of losing your license quicker by failing to pay your dues on time than if you shot the mother of the Chief Justice, than if you robbed a widow of her inheritance, than if you stole everything that orphans possess. It doesn't take any hearing or any kind of procedure if you don't pay your dues to have your license lifted, but all these other things take a long time and a lot of hearings. Those things have not been touched and an association composed of people who engage in the types of things that I've mentioned are the ones who are dictating what this Legislature is to do and the Legislature is bowing to that dictation. I did not support...

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: 181, I'm not going to support 181A, I have not supported these types of bills in the past. They have passed. The only thing that I can think of offhand, and maybe there would be more if I'd really put my mind to it, that I commend Governor Orr for having done, former Governor Orr, is vetoing a bill of this kind. I wouldn't want her back because I had several very meritorious bills that she vetoed also, but you have to give credit where credit is due. I know this bill is going to advance. Having had the opportunity to say what I wanted to say, I will not call for a machine vote on this one.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Does anyone else wish to speak to this bill? Seeing none, you've heard the motion to advance to E & R. All those in favor please say aye. Opposed nay. LB 181A is advanced. We'll proceed with Select File, LB 425.
