

SENATOR MOORE: Okay. Now moving on to the next phase, I don't know if I should ask you or Senator Schellpeper this. But in reading Section 8 of the bill, does that mandate the State Patrol to be up to 85 percent by '95?

SENATOR ASHFORD: No, if the State Patrol should get up...be at the 85 percent level, which is, from what we can tell is as close to perfect as you can get, because there's always going to be give and take in the records, as new records come in. But if they get to that level by 1995, and it's my understanding from Senator Schellpeper that they're getting about 5 percent a year into the system, or 10 percent, if they get to that level, then the instant check system can go into effect at that point. So...and now that cost ..I don't know, quite frankly, Senator Moore, at this point how they're allocating, I suppose just internally. When they're putting these records on the computer now it's with existing personnel, I suspect. I don't know how they're doing it other than that. And I don't know if there would be an additional cost...

SENATOR MOORE: Well who...who makes that decision in '95?

SENATOR ASHFORD: Well I...

SENATOR MOORE: The Legislature?

SENATOR ASHFORD: The Leg...as I envision it, and we may have to clean up the language on select, is that the State Patrol would certify to the Legislature that they're at 85 percent. And then the Legis...

SENATOR MOORE: If they're not...

SENATOR ASHFORD: If they're not, then it doesn't go into effect.

SENATOR MOORE: And if they are, it automatically comes into effect?

SENATOR ASHFORD: Well, I think they have to...the intent is that they certify to the Legislature that they're at 85 percent, and then the instant check would be implemented. And that's...that's the intent. Now the language...we may have to work on the language on Select a little bit. But that's the intent.
