

the state records would have to also be updated and put in the system in order for the AFIS system to adequately function. So AFIS does motivate, in a sense, the whole system to be updated.

SENATOR WARNER: But, but specifically is 85 percent completed in state criminal records only?

SENATOR ASHFORD: Yes, it's in state arrests and convictions, in state.

SENATOR WARNER: So this would not apply then to...

SENATOR ASHFORD: No.

SENATOR WARNER: ...to the out of state...

SENATOR ASHFORD: No, no, the out...no. It would not apply to the out of state records. It would apply only to the state records. There is the McCollum...there is federal law that has not been funded adequately to fund the federal records as well. And I suppose that's going to be dealt with by Congress. But it's...I think the 1995 date is intended to sort of reflect the idea that the federal and the state laws will kind of develop...or the systems will develop concomitantly, together. So that's basically where we're at.

SPEAKER BAACK: One minute.

SENATOR WARNER: The reason I asked the question, again, maybe you can comment, because on page 8 and a couple other places, there is reference to these criminal records to comply with both state and federal law. And I didn't know where...if you were complying with federal law, if federal law required all state criminal records, as it now stands, or if in state is sufficient. And, again, I'm relating back to the 85 percent.

SENATOR ASHFORD: Senator Warner, I think you made a good point. And Bernie Glaser just pointed out to me the fact that this bill is intended to apply only to state records, that we are not responsible for federal records. And we'll try to clear up any ambiguity on the...Select File.

SENATOR WARNER: It's...I'm not trying to create an issue,...

SENATOR ASHFORD: No, I think it's a good point.
