

SENATOR HEFNER: So then I'd have a choice to go and either...to either place.

SENATOR ASHFORD: Yes, sir.

SENATOR HEFNER: Okay. Who gets the \$5 then, does...

SENATOR ASHFORD: The way it's structured now the \$5 would go to the local law enforcement agent...would go to the locality, it would not go back to the state. That's the way it has worked in Omaha. The intent, at this point, would be that it stay there. Under the instant check system the money would go, if that goes into effect, the money would go back to the state.

SENATOR HEFNER: Okay. I see in Section 3 here of the amendment says, the application form and certificate shall be made on forms approved by the superintendent of law enforcement and public safety. Then would that same department print those and send those out?

SENATOR ASHFORD: The State Patrol would approve the forms, and...that's what that is, the State Patrol. They would...they would approve the form and they would be responsible for sending that form out.

SENATOR HEFNER: Okay, does any...will anybody keep a duplicate certificate of these?

SENATOR ASHFORD: No, there will be no record...there's no provision in the bill for duplicates or records keeping of those certificates.

SENATOR HEFNER: Okay, do you suppose that some of these people would be able to copy a certificate of their own?

SENATOR ASHFORD: I suspect, like any system, there are ways to get around it, Senator Hefner, and, you know, one of the ways might be to photocopy, but I think again the idea would be that this would be a uniform certificate and I suppose, just like a driver's license or anything else, they could be duplicated. But the idea would be that they would be uniform and easily identifiable.
