

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you very much, Senator Hartnett. And he's kind of given you his version of what I've been saying and I'm just continuing to make sure you have a complete description as given to us by the gaming division. When the player is being...when the game is being run, the numbers the system is selecting are displayed on the touch pad screen. If any of the player selected numbers are picked by the computer, then they're highlighted by a light that comes up behind them. The intervals between games are programmed at the computer and can be as frequent as the management wants. As tested, the interval between the games is 20 seconds, is all. Each player who selects numbers and presses play will be playing the same keno game. In other words, the same keno game is sent to all players at their stations. So each one of them individually is playing but it's going to all of the...the same game is being played by all players at the same time. In other words, the same keno game, as I said, is being sent to all players at their stations. The station terminals don't provide individualized keno games. In addition, the player does not activate the keno game by pressing play. That function is programmed into the control computer and it begins the play when that next game comes on line. If the player wins or loses, the screen displays how many remaining credits are available to the player and the player can repeat the play process or remove his card and return it to the game operator to cash out. If the player chooses to remain and play, he or she may play the amount of credits available, whether those credits include the amounts of the original purchase or accumulated winnings. Upon cashing out, the player surrenders the card to the operator who accesses the system and determines how much the player is entitled to and gives that amount to the player. While that computerized game is the same game operated by the previously approved random number generator, it provides the additional feature of direct player access but not player activation of the game without going through an employee or the game operator. The Department of Revenue has informed DDT that the system needs two modifications prior to being finally ruled legal and one of them was the reason I asked the question of Senator Hall regarding the written ticket. And, you know, I want to make sure that that is the intent, that it does not mean that we're trying to meet the requirements of this system to be put in place to have that in the amendment and that was my reason for asking the question. With that, that's basically what you're doing here and it does come down to what we were talking about a little earlier. As
