

SENATOR CROSBY: Oh, okay, I just wanted to ask you a quick question so I understand. I'm going to vote red on this, Senator Withem, but as a signal to the people that feel that it should...there should be a complete study and come back to the Legislature with what we expect of this commission. So my question, my first question is, is...has someone entered a study resolution for that purpose or are you just going to do it through your committee or what?

SENATOR WITHEM: I think it's being drafted. I don't remember if we've actually introduced it but it's my intent to introduce one.

SENATOR CROSBY: You're going to do something formally for those people...

SENATOR WITHEM: Right.

SENATOR CROSBY: ...who feel that they won't be able to come in...

SENATOR WITHEM: Sure.

SENATOR CROSBY: ...and register their feelings. The other thing, the commission itself are teachers, administrators and one person from higher education. Do I understand that correctly? It hasn't changed any from what it was originally?

SENATOR WITHEM: It hasn't changed any. I could not recite for you the exact makeup.

SENATOR CROSBY: Yeah, okay, thank you. I just wanted to make those things clear because I have had some people call and write who perhaps maybe don't understand or see the whole picture but understand what PPC was supposed to have done originally and that they felt were continuing to do. So I'm going to vote red on this amendment, simply so they will realize that I am listening and paying attention and that I think probably that we do need to study it and to come back in '92 so we understand what they're supposed to do. And if you want to get rid of it, fine, but I don't think you should leave them hanging in limbo. Thank you.
