

SENATOR HILLMAN: Okay. Also, are any of yours on state plan on hourly wage where they get overtime?

SENATOR MOORE: Well, the only ones that get overtime would be the State Patrolmen, and as far as that, I mean, most of them use compensatory time.

SENATOR HILLMAN: So on your state plan here was Secretary I, II, and so forth, none of those receive overtime, if they work overtime?

SENATOR MOORE: Well, I hesitate to say none of them do, but I don't know if any of them do. I guess some of them would get overtime, yes.

SENATOR HILLMAN: Okay, so they do get paid time and a half if they work over the 40 hour week.

SENATOR MOORE: I would assume so, if they get overtime, the ones that do.

SENATOR HILLMAN: Okay. I was just looking for a comparison to see if that's the total pay package and what we're talking about here when we do comparisons, and if we're comparing...you really think we're comparing apples and apples, or could there be some leeway in here?

SENATOR MOORE: Well, there are some differences. I think Senator Chambers has...has talked about some of those differences.

SENATOR HILLMAN: I know job security is one, but I'm talking about monetary.

SENATOR MOORE: Job security is one, but as far as the benefit package, I mean, the bulk of state employees do not receive overtime. I'm not saying...there are some isolated cases where it is granted, but usually is it not. And as far as insurance and other benefits, those are comparable, if not the very same.

SENATOR HILLMAN: Okay, thank you.
