PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Madam Chairman and members, and to Senator Warner, I apologize, too. I should have caught it earlier, but we waited until you finished with your explanation on your amendment because it was my intention to revisit the issue immediately because I would ask, and I only did this as a point of order to make sure that the system is served, that my amendment to 1574, which had to do with the tuition assistance, cost of tuition as compared to professors teaching classes, I would ask permission of the body to lay this amendment over until after my AM2008 to AM1947. I would request that so we can continue then with Senator Warner's amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: We will pass on that and go back to Senator Warner's.

CLERK: Then, Madam President, we are discussing Senator Warner's amendment to his amendment, the one he just explained, AM1946.

PRESIDENT MOUL: All right, Senator Lindsay, would you like to address Senator Warner's amendment.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Thank you, Madam President, members. This amendment I think...excuse me, are we on the Lynch amendment or are we on the...

PRESIDENT MOUL: No, we are on the Warner amendment.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Never mind, I had better not get smart here. The amendment here would strike the proprietaries from the sharing in any of the assistance to students that is funded by the state, and that may be a good concept, something that maybe the Legislature ought to look at, but I think it is something that we ought to at least do by giving some notice to the proprietaries. The Warner amendment, the thick amendment, AM1574, which I believe Senator Warner didn't want it printed to save the state some expense on printing, but it was not printed in the Journal.
