

North Central, with the exception of three that I simply wasn't able to identify at this particular point in time. They may be accredited too, I just don't know.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Does anyone wish to speak to the Beutler amendment? Seeing none, we will now vote. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 32 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on adoption of Senator Beutler's amendment to the bill.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The Beutler amendment is adopted.

CLERK: The next amendment, Madam President, is by Senator Lynch. Senator, this is the amendment we passed over a little earlier, AM1940. (The Lynch amendment appears on page 2379 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Yeah. Madam Chairman and members, just so you understand, it's my intention to withdraw this amendment for a lot of reasons. First of all, and most importantly, because the original Warner amendment was, in fact, withdrawn, but also if, in fact, we did run with this legislation, it would provide when students are taught by other students a 75 percent factor for tuition per hour. In the institutions, it could mean a difference in income to the institutions of almost \$2,300,000. It's important enough that we have to discuss it and we should consider it because when those students pay that full tuition I think most people thought and assumed they would have teachers, professors, not students. But it's one of those things that I think we can discuss in an Appropriation hearing and with, in fact, the institutions involved. Given that, and although I know and I understand from a number of you there was some support to do this, it really would probably be inappropriate at this time to do that. But just so the institutions all understand that it is not a forgotten issue, we will discuss it, understand it better. But, at this time, I would respectfully ask for permission to withdraw this amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Lynch. The amendment is withdrawn.
