PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Robinson. Senator Moore.

SENATOR MOORE: Well, speaking on the Kearney, I guess it's really on the Kearney issue because that's the one we're talking about, you know, it's one of those things where the Kearney folks have made a very good point on their Cash/General mix saying that they're proportionately so much higher than everybody else. But then, when you actually compare them with UNO and if you actually take the Institute out of UNL, they're not that much different, you know? You know, I think Doug Kristensen used the figures of 64.3 and 35.7. Is that right, Doug? You know, and said how horrible that was and UNO is 66 and 33.9, not...just about as bad. And if you take the Institute, where we do a bulk of our research at University of Nebraska at Lincoln, if you take that out, I mean if that's in it's 75/25 at UNL, if you take it out, when you just talk about the actual educational component at UNL, it's 66 and 33. I mean it's actually not that much different than Kearney's. So you talk about...and I'm not saying Kearney don't have a need, but to say that it's so dramatically different than everybody else, take into account, you know, the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, it's statewide, does a lot of things statewide, if you take that component out for University of Nebraska, then it's not that much different than Kearney. Now another thing you've got to remember at Kearney is that, at the same that they are concerned about funding levels, they also talk about space requirements and they talk about the situation of, you know, we've got to have more space and, once again, the Legislature's recognized that thus far including an addition to Copeland Hall, get into more square footage. On the other hand, the same time they ask for more money, the legitimate question to ask is where on earth are you going to put it? I mean, Senator Kristensen gave a great argument about what the problem was right now. What are you going to do with more money until you address the space problem? Now it's one of those things that time and time again this Legislature has been chastised for
