

there and kick around because it means nothing. I want to see how many are going to stick and I want to see if they get enough votes to pass this bill and carry it through. And I want to see if they're going to have enough votes to override a veto should it come. If, instead of a 90-day legislative session, we had a 120-day session, the urgency would not be here that we experience now and we would be willing to take more time and proceed with a greater amount of deliberation. We could vote to extend the session or we could have a special session. I think it's a mistake to try to blunder through redistricting, pretend that we're going to solve the tax problems, and then there are other important issues that are pending before us in the few days remaining in this session. Tempers will flare. Nerves will get frayed. There will be a great frustration level, and if we do act in haste on these issues, then when the chickens come home to roost, as they certainly will, people are going to scramble and say, well, I didn't know what we were doing, I was in a hurry, I thought this was best. I don't believe there is a great amount of thought going on right now and that's why I enjoy this period of the Legislature. Abnormal psychology is a fascinating subject to study from a book but it is even more intriguing to watch it in operation and that's what happens around here at a time like this.

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm not going to be able to support Senator Hall's amendment. Senator Hall, I think it would be inappropriate for me to give a vote just to attach it to the bill when there is no way that I could support it. And were it attached to the bill, I could not and would not support the bill. It probably will be attached tonight but not with my help. And I will vote against that amendment and then I will vote against the bill. I'm only one vote but at some point one vote may be significant in the life or death of this bill.
