

SENATOR WESELY: That's what we're looking for.

SENATOR ROBINSON: ..so to speak then, is that correct?

SENATOR WESELY: But I'm going to be a little bit vague because we're trying to keep it open-ended so that we work through how that happens and everything, so what we've come upon on the whole issue is that we need to involve people and allow input and make a decision that's in the best interest of everybody and I think...

SENATOR ROBINSON: Yes.

SENATOR WESELY: ..everybody's satisfied with that approach.

SENATOR ROBINSON: I had a lady visit with me today about her daughter and she was concerned about being involved if her daughter was moved from one area to the other. Now is that included in the bill, Don?

SENATOR WESELY: No, that wouldn't happen, no. There would not be somebody moved from one region to another and most likely whatever case manager they have now will probably continue to be their case manager.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Now, I don't...I'm not sure I got my point across. Her daughter is a patient or a client at one of the mental health centers. Now if she were moved from one residential setting to the other, this lady's concern was that a lot of times they have no input; that...

SENATOR WESELY: Oh. Oh. Oh. No, hopefully, that would be...actually we want more input.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Yes.

SENATOR WESELY: This sets up a due process system and (inaudible).

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay.

SENATOR WESELY: So what we're trying to find...

SENATOR ROBINSON: So it would put due process into it.
