PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Pirsch.

SENATOR CONWAY: I heard you say that you both agreed and it would make it a lot cleaner and I'm all for those kinds of changes and I think no one...

SENATOR PIRSCH: Yes.

SENATOR CONWAY: ...knows their own district better than the...

SENATOR PIRSCH: Right.

SENATOR CONWAY: ...senator who serves it and so I'm sure it's very valid in that sense. But have you had a chance to know what the...what the net exchange difference is and does that impact upon your net sums within 2 percentage points either way?

SENATOR PIRSCH: Senator Lynch mentioned one registered voter, as I said. This line comes out over a ravine. It comes up a railroad. There's a ravine and a school, I would say maybe two or three houses...

SENATOR CONWAY: So it's...

SENATOR PIRSCH: ...and that would be it.

SENATOR CONWAY: The one registered voter...

SENATOR PIRSCH: It's kind of wide open spaces.

SENATOR CONWAY: ...situation is a netting situation. There are several people involved but there is a subtraction and addition so, therefore, you get a net difference of one or there's maybe only one family involved or one voter involved.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Yes, and I'm not real sure about that. Maybe Senator Lynch can speak to that...

SENATOR CONWAY: Let me ask Senator Lynch the same question and see if he's...since he has the upper...
