SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Hall. Next item on the bill, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Hall would move to amend 320. His amendments may be found on page 1851 of the Journal.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Mr. President and members. The issue here is the same amendment that we debated on General File that was just a straight 80 percent of market. There was no allowance for the income formula as has been before the body a number of times, and as the original introduction of 320, and as Senator Landis, as introducer of the bill, would adopt. Senator Landis has an amendment to follow that deals with, to a certain extent, to the same issue of market and comes even closer to the market approach than the way the bill currently is drafted. At this time, if Senator Landis is available, and if he would respond, if he...

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Landis, would you respond, please.

SENATOR HALL: ...so chose. Senator Landis, at this point, it appears to be, and I did not...I was just thinking about this as I looked at this sheet dealing with the last two amendments, it would make more sense to me if you're of the desire to do it this way, take your amendment first, and then run mine. Should yours be adopted into the bill, at least the bill would be in the proper form. If you would rather run yours first I would relinquish this spot on the...I would pull that amendment or replace...substitute mine, I will let you substitute yours at this time, if it makes sense. Otherwise, I will run this and we will go from there. Because, basically, what we are going to do is argue your amendment on mine which...

SENATOR LANDIS: Right.

SENATOR HALL: ...I'd just as soon have it in front of us right now. It would be more economical in terms of time.

SENATOR LANDIS: That will be fine.
