CLERK: Mr. President, your Committee on Enrollment and Review respectfully reports they have carefully examined and reviewed LB 618 and recommend the same be placed on Select File; LB 617, LB 619, LB 615, LB 616, all on Select File, some of which have Enrollment and Review amendments attached. SPEAKER BAACK: Mr. Clerk, we'll now proceed to Item 6 on the agenda, the motion by Senator Landis to return LB 419.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Landis would move to return LB 419 to Select File for a specific amendment. The amendment may be found on page 2531 of the Journal. (See AM2144.)

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. By bringing this motion at this time and if it's successful, we will avoid a printing of this bill in final form prior to the amendment, so we're saving ourselves a little money by doing it at this time and I'm grateful for the Clerk and the Speaker in allowing us to do it in such a timely fashion. This amendment alters only the operative date of two sections of a bill. The bill, LB 419, contains a series of changes in the insurance area. It was an amendment that Senator Wesely offered to a variety of items that had been before the Banking, Commerce and Insurance Committee, and putting them all under one package and then sending it on to Final Reading. Two of the parts of the package need operative dates of October 1, 1991, rather than the E clause, which is attached to the bill. Those two sections are the small employer group insurance bill, LB 537, a bill that was unanimously supported by Blue Cross/Blue Shield, Mutual of Omaha, the Department of Insurance, and the Health Insurance Association of
