

reasonable. This, I'm worried, takes us just a little further in the fact that I don't know. We've had a case in, where was it, Vermont or Maine, where a person shot and killed a person in their backyard and he got...and he was acquitted, and so it seems like, you know, that hunters already have quite a bit of leniency in this area.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Well, Senator, I don't believe...now if they'll go along and put up "no hunting" signs the whole length of the trail during hunting season every so often to call to the hunters attention, to call to everybody's attention that there is no hunting, then to me this is different. A private hunter or a private farmer can put up "no hunting" signs. Then I believe his liability goes away if he puts up those signs and people trespass on his land. That isn't going to happen here unless...maybe it's not written correctly. The intent is there. I'm sure that if Senator Beutler was in favor of the amendment, he could write it, due to his profession, so that it would fit. If the intent is there and if it's not written correctly, if it's adopted, we can write it correctly and put it in when it goes to E & R.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Next speaker is Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Question.

SPEAKER BAACK: The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. We will now vote on ceasing debate. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. We're voting on ceasing debate. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 nays, to cease debate, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Haberman, do you wish to close? Debate has ceased (inaudible).

SENATOR HABERMAN: Yes, Mr. President and members of the body, Senator Beutler addressed two issues. I think he addressed the fact that some words are not proper because it wouldn't be legal, and then he asked are these people different than other people and I'll say, Chris, no, they're not different. The hunters aren't different. The shells aren't different. The
