

50 percent of the machine revenue. What we have done is given up our ability to run a state lottery to date. We have no state lottery. We've given that to the locals. We've said, you guys go ahead and run it, you raise the revenue. I'm saying that if we're going to do that, we need to upgrade the technology and the state needs to take a portion of that.

SENATOR ROBAK: I guess I'm a little confused. I like part of it but part of it I don't like. So I don't know what I will do. Thank you.

SENATOR HALL: Uh-huh.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Robak. Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Madam President. Tim, you stated your intent as far as the definition what you call the player-accessed device.

SENATOR HALL: Yes.

SENATOR SMITH: For what it's worth, I know you're aware that South Dakota's video lottery is going through a central computer.

SENATOR HALL: That's correct.

SENATOR SMITH: So could this be construed to be the same thing or do the same thing?

SENATOR HALL: It could not. It only relates to video keno, it only relates to the Local Option Lottery Act. There is no way I think that there could be an interpretation made that this would be a video lottery proposal within the confines of our own statute and the limitations within the Nebraska Local Option Lottery Act.

SENATOR SMITH: All right. And I have an amendment to your amendment as far as your intent regarding the 20/22 situation we were discussing a little bit ago and I will address that a little bit later. If someone wants my time they can have it or do we have other people that are going to be speaking on the issue?

PRESIDENT MOUL: There is no one else wishing to speak on the
