SENATOR ROBINSON: Fifty-one. Then, Senator Will was talking about the amendment and I thought the way he was talking about it that it was just...you just had to have a liquor license. Which is it?

SENATOR WILL: The 51 percent, Senator Robinson, refers to the receipts of the establishment that must come from other than pickle cards. It's not 51 percent of their sales have to come from alcoholic beverages, but 51 percent of their sales have to
