SENATOR MOORE: If the constitutional amendment passes and the Legislature, you say present exemptions, the way the bill reads right now, the things we...the way 892 reads right now, telephone is centrally assessed, go back on the tax rolls in '92. Correct?

SENATOR LINDSAY: On 829?
