

supporters of the Lindsay amendment, I don't know, maybe they didn't understand what the Warner amendment prior to that did. I would think if I was of the attitude that there was unfair exemptions laying out there, and was concerned about those exemptions harming the homeowner, I think the Warner amendment got you a lot more than the Lindsay amendment ever would of, as simple as that. Because in ten years it has to be revisited. In ten years they go away. It's going to take an affirmative action by this body to reimpose those. Now if the preference would be to remove the Warner amendment, I guess I wouldn't have a problem voting for the Lindsay amendment, to tell you the truth, I would have no problem at all. I guess my concern is what happens 10, 20, 30 years from now, because we are not talking about changing the statute here, we're talking about putting it in the Constitution. And Senator Warner's amendment we talked...we place in the Constitution that any exemption we hand out, even after the 3-R Committee, if it actually...if it comes to pass and we actually do something with it, if exemptions are put on, they go away in ten years. Unlike anything else that an exemption would be placed in, it would go on into perpetuity, forever. And I think with the Warner amendment many of the people that have concerns about an unfair tax system being put into place, the best thing they got with the Warner amendment was ten years from now you got to do it all over again. And I think...I think that is a major, major victory for some people who are concerned about what the Legislature will do. And I think LR 186, with that addition to it, is something that I think all of us, all of us in all parts of the state, in all 49 districts, can go sell to our voters and say, give us the tools to develop a sound tax policy, whatever tax policy we develop we're going to have to review 10 years from now and get 25 votes to do it. That seems to make a lot of sense. I think with the Warner amendment I think it was a very wise addition to this LR 186. I think it's unfortunate the...I'm sure the 14 people that supported the Lindsay amendment, I suppose you understand that if you want to repeal the Warner amendment I would certainly vote for the Lindsay amendment very easily. With the Warner amendment you got a whole lot more.
