We would welcome him with open arms and, in this case, with the wisdom that he brings with his legal education and his ability to get through law school without attending very much, I'm envious, Ernie. But, in any case, this is a...to indefinitely postpone at this point makes little sense. We need to, I think, one way or another find out the...where the body lies on this issue. And I would argue that if you, again, that if you don't support LR 186, don't vote for it. If there is any question in your mind, don't vote for it. That's the only way to deal with it.
