

All it does is makes it clear that the Legislature can enact such a law. But this is not a self-effecting statute, I meant provision of the Constitution. The Legislature would have to act.

SPEAKER BAACK: Next speaker, Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Question.

SPEAKER BAACK: Do I see five hands? I do. We will now vote on ceasing debate. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. We are voting on ceasing debate. Have you all voted? Voting on ceasing debate. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: Debate has ceased. Senator Chambers, would you like to close?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I have a question of the Chair.

SPEAKER BAACK: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Can I withdraw that?

SPEAKER BAACK: The question?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Since we haven't voted on it, that amendment because as it's drafted it would go to the bill. I would withdraw it, then offer a substitute which is free-standing. I have no debate on it because that's been done. Then the vote that would be taken would be on the proposition, not as a part of the bill. Well, I can withdraw it if I want to because no vote has been taken on it.

SPEAKER BAACK: Yes, it is perfectly legitimate to withdraw it, yes, since we have not voted.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's what I would do and I substitute what is already on the Clerk's desk, and it's the same thing except it's free-standing and not a part of the lottery proposition, and I have nothing to say on it because all that I've said was said. It's not a part of the lottery proposition. It would be voted on separately in the same way that the Commonwealth matter
