

the Beutler amendment which struck the previous language, this will simply bring us back to where we were after we adopted that amendment. I would urge its adoption.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Will. Senator Hall, did you wish to discuss that amendment?

SENATOR HALL: No. Question.

SPEAKER BAACK: That won't be necessary. There are no other lights on. Senator Smith, did you need to close? We will vote on the Smith amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Smith's amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: The amendment is adopted. Anything further on the bill, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Yes, sir. Senator Chambers would move to amend, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I will ask the Clerk to read the amendment as drafted so that you will know it is designed to be a separate free-standing proposition and E & R would put the appropriate wording to it and the brief comments I made before plus the very brief ones I will make afterward will make it clear on the record what is intended.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Chambers' amendment reads as follows. To add a separate ballot proposition, add the following language: "Nothing in this Constitution shall prohibit the enactment of laws providing for the licensing and regulation of wagering on sporting events."

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Members of the Legislature, that has been discussed already. It is to be a separate ballot proposition. I hope that you will vote in favor of it.

SPEAKER BAACK: Discussion. Seeing none, Senator Chambers, do you wish to close? We will now vote on the amendment by Senator Chambers. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no.
