

providing those senators that if, indeed, it goes over 25, vote for the emergency clause, would then go ahead and put it over 33. And before you leave, Senator Moore, I have a question for you. First of all, who was talking about withdrawing from the compact, so why do we need figures on withdrawal when no one is talking about withdrawal of the compact?

SENATOR MOORE: I don't know if withdrawal from the compact is the right words, but I think if you're not living up to what you said you were going to, obviously, it would alter the present state considerably.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Okay, and you understand now that the compact commissioners that are in charge of this situation voted to allow us to have community consent and then said they need the state to define that. You understand that.

SENATOR MOORE: Yes.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: So, why are we not...by doing this we are living up to what the compact commissioners are asking of us.

SENATOR MOORE: I guess I don't know enough about that. I only know...I don't know what they said. I don't know what they meant when they said, I have no idea.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: They didn't know either and they said they wanted a definition and we are thus about to give them a definition of community consent so we'd be doing what the people in charge have guaranteed and asked for. So then thus we would not be withdrawing, we'd be complying with the wishes of the commissioners.

SENATOR MOORE: What happens when they vote not to build the compact, what happens then?

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Well, then it's up to the compact commissioners to go back to Article V of the compact and site the facility the way they were charged to do with community consent.

SENATOR MOORE: With community consent.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Yes. Now, would you also like to see costs, estimated costs sustained in the compact? I believe I have for
