CLERK: 2210.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Okay, this amendment is...just includes any firearms that were manufactured in or before 1898. The other bill didn't get into any of the antique firearms and this amendment does. It takes care of them. I passed out the explanation of the amendments. And so this was in part of LB 801 so we're just putting it back in. So it just deals with antique firearms. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Schellpeper. Does anyone wish to address this amendment? Seeing none, do you have closing? Closing is waived. We will now vote on the Schellpeper amendment. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Schellpeper.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Thank you, Madam President, and members, this amendment deals with the implementation of the instant criminal check records and it says that they shall be the intent that they will do it as fast as possible. And also every year the State Patrol will give a report to the Legislature how they are coming with their criminal record checks so that we will know how far they are going each year and what is happening with their criminal record check. So that way the Legislature has an idea how far away we are. It is the intent that it will go into effect January 1, 1995. And also this amendment says that they will not go back any farther than January 1, 1965 because any records that are 30 years old should not have to be gone over because they would probably be outdated anyway. So this just deals with records that are 30 years old. So, with that, it's mainly a technical amendment and I would move for the adoption of the amendment.
