

They want the state to underwrite it, and then, if the thing falls through, let the state try to realize its money through the salvage value. I think it is very poor policy. I think it's sending good money after bad, not a viable economic proposition for the state, and I hope you will vote against the passage of this bill.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Kristensen.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Madam President, members of the body. I intend to pull this motion. So if there are others for or against, who want to speak, I would give them some time to get to the desk as I finish this. It was not my intention to spark a full debate, I guess was basically to give you some opinions and some observations and some when do I become nervous sort of speeches, because of the record. And I also wanted to make sure that Senator Lamb and Senator Wickersham had a full opportunity to speak for their bill, and that's the reason I waited for my light and allowed them to speak. With that, Madam President, I would ask to have that motion pulled from the desk.

PRESIDENT MOUL: If there are no objections, it's so ordered. Is there anything further, Mr. Clerk? Okay. We'll proceed with reading LB 783.

ASSISTANT CLERK: (Read LB 783 on Final Reading.)

PRESIDENT MOUL: All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 783 pass with the emergency clause attached? All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Read record vote as found on page 2846 of the Legislative Journal.) 28 ayes, 17 nays, 3 present and not voting, 1 excused and not voting.

PRESIDENT MOUL: LB 783 fails with the emergency clause. We will now vote on LB 783 without the emergency clause. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Read record vote as found on pages 2846-47 of the Legislative Journal.) 27 ayes, 19 nays, Madam President.
