**SPEAKER BAACK:** Senator Hall.

**SENATOR HALL:** Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members. The bracket motion is here because the rules read that on a legislative resolution, constitutional amendment that it does, in essence, function much like an E clause to a bill, that once the vote was taken and it failed to receive the 40 votes necessary for the special election vote that was originally in the proposal, that a vote would be taken to put the issue on the next general election ballot. Rather than have that taken up, the bracket motion is to put the bill off until tomorrow, or the resolution off until tomorrow, possibly take a look at whether the body wants to reconsider the motion, or if there is going to be any pending amendments, many of which I've heard wind of, floating out there. But at this point in time, it makes sense to bracket the proposal until tomorrow.

**SPEAKER BAACK:** Senator Hall, you asking unanimous consent to bracket until tomorrow morning?

**SENATOR HALL:** I would so ask.

**SPEAKER BAACK:** Is there objection?

**SENATOR CHAMBERS:** I object.

**SPEAKER BAACK:** There is an objection, so now we will treat it as a motion to bracket. Debatable. Senator Schmit, your light is on. Anyone else wishing to debate the motion to bracket the bill? Seeing none, Senator Hall, do you wish to close? Waives closing. We will now vote on the motion to bracket. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record, Mr. Clerk.

**CLERK:** 34 ayes, 4 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to bracket the resolution.

**SPEAKER BAACK:** The resolution is bracketed. We'll now proceed to Item 8, Final Reading. LB 67.

**CLERK:** (Read LB 67 on Final Reading.)

**SPEAKER BAACK:** All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 67 pass? All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Members, would
