

we're at with this program. How does it integrate with other programs? How does it integrate with a broader vision of what we tried to accomplish with the passage of the bill? And I don't want to sound a lot like Senator Schmit talked about the bills he's passed and how they've gone awry, I did have a little bit to do with the bill, co-sponsored it and worked with Senator Kerrey on it and, obviously, I'm not particularly pleased with the way it's gone of late. That doesn't mean it doesn't have a lot of validity and ultimately can be on the right track again. But I think one of the ways you accomplish that is not to do business as usual and keep funding it the way that we have been funding it when there are problems. I haven't heard anybody talk about yet some of the fundamental concerns Senator Crosby talked about, it's working. Yeah, in some cases we've had some success and I'm pleased that that's happened. I'm proud of that. But I think, again, we can't ignore the problems I raised earlier. At a \$900,000 a year expense for a \$2 million a year entity, you can't spend a million to invest a million. The overhead is ridiculous. We've done some research in other states and, Senator Crosby, maybe you're aware of this or not. Would you yield to a question? Yeah.
