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would be much better to just say treat everybody like a human being and the way you'd like to be treated, but that's not enough and that's why you have such a thick requirement when it comes to judicial ethics and lawyer ethics, because there's not a tendency to do that which is right. So if they would decide to be fair and correct the problems that they've seen, what we're talking about here wouldn't even be necessary.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Rod Johnson.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: Question.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Do I have sufficient seconds to call the question? I do. We'll now vote on the motion to cease debate. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate.

PRESIDENT MOUL: We have ceased debate. Recognize Senator Landis for closing.

SENATOR LANDIS: Madam President, members of the Legislature, institutions need to realize from among themselves their own failings if they're going to change. They do not respond well to the erratic criticism from outside, or the challenges and argumentation from without. They most successfully amend themselves by studying their own needs, analyzing, and coming to grips as an institution. The judiciary has said, we will study ourselves. We will see our patterns. We will examine our practices and we will take appropriate action. Those of you who have ever been involved with an institutional change, I think, those of you who have served in this body know that we don't respond well to the criticism of the Governor or the criticisms of the external forces. It's when we, ourselves, get together and criticize ourselves that we start making changes among ourselves, and that's the way institutions change. They change from within, particularly when they're a co-equal branch of government, in this case. Seems to me that we want to engender, we want to encourage this kind of self-examination, this self-motivated desire to change, to examine and chart new paths for the judicial branch, and I don't think that a couple of stern speeches on the floor of the Legislature is going to provoke them into change. It's not that easy. It's not that
