

decide, and if the court decides for us I guess, for the time being we have a window in which we can prudently spend these dollars for some much needed things, and I don't need to go through the list with everybody. I think we've discussed what these projects are. The Wayne situation was something, and a variety of these things were cut down considerably to try and fit. I don't think they were cut down to the point where the Wayne building originally came in at 7 million dollars, we appropriated 4 million dollars. UNO was over 3 million dollars and it's down to 2.6. The North Platte situation came in at literally millions of dollars and I would add that all of the things, particularly at the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, strictly my opinion here, that unless you construct these things at this time with this money, that they will probably never garner the support of General Funds to be constructed. It's simple as that. Now, yes, if you decide to sustain the Governor's veto, this money will not go away and there will be, I would guess, I would venture to bet at least, that if we override this veto, unless we're...there may, indeed, be a plan to come in next year to use it for prisons, but even with that I am sure that you will see if you veto...if you do not override this veto and sustain it, you will see probably more than six proposals coming in from a variety of different people that choose to use this money...

SPEAKER BAACK PRESIDING

SPEAKER BAACK: One minute.

SENATOR MOORE: ..on a variety of projects. Now it has been a standing, you know, not always but usually these dollars have gone for capital construction and higher education. This was continued with the committee's plan in 760, was continued when the Legislature reaffirmed that by passing it and sending it to the Governor. As I mentioned, the Appropriations Committee recommends this veto be overridden in its entirety. With that, I would move LB 760 be overridden.
