

support the Lindsay amendment. If the majority do not, if there are those who wish to attempt to take the amendment that was put on that I offered the other day and in lieu of that, have 30 votes for new exemptions, I haven't seen how it is written, I'll support that. My big concern is notwithstanding what others may feel, I think it's imperative that we enact a constitutional amendment that will deal with tangible, personal property. I don't want to create a crisis. I admit that the Legislature tends to not face with some issues until the crisis is on us, but this one, this thundercloud is about a section away from me, that's a mile, and it's coming fast and it will be here. I think we make a major mistake if we cannot resolve what is a relatively minor disagreement, at least up to this point, with one option or the other. If you do not want...if a review every 10 years is, you'd rather have 30 votes, I can live with that for new exemptions. It's not that big an issue.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Warner. We will now vote on the motion to return to Select File. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 23 ayes, 22 nays, Madam President, on the motion to return the bill.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The motion fails.

CLERK: Madam President, Senator Will would move to return LR 186CA for purposes of striking the enacting clause.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: I'd like to withdraw that.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Motion is to withdraw. Any further motion?

CLERK: I have nothing further on the resolution, Madam President.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Withem.

SENATOR WITHEM: If there is absolutely nothing else, I would like to renew the bracket motion again for purposes of...unless somebody can convince me there is a good reason to take it for a vote, get 30 votes so that it will go on the ballot in 1992, I
