

rather than have to close them down, that's why we are putting in this amendment.

SENATOR LAMB: But on...if I could continue on line 9, it says, no person...it goes on to say, no person shall be permitted, and so forth. Then you get down to 9, either inside the enclosure, or within 40 rods. So, you're...you're permitting that to happen inside the enclosure, as well as within 40 rods outside. So, I don't quite understand that.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Well, they're already...they already can do that. We're not changing that part of the law at all, Senator Lamb. That part of the law...if they get a liquor license, they can do it right now. We're not changing that part at all. We're just changing outside of the actual fairgrounds.

SENATOR LAMB: Well I don't...

PRESIDENT MOUL: Time.

SENATOR LAMB: I don't understand.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Lamb. Senator Wesely. Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Madam President, I yield my time to Senator Lamb, if he'd like to have it.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: Thank you, Senator Haberman. I don't know what I can add, except, as I read it, you know, if you're just reading plain English, it strikes some language which prohibits the sale of intoxicating liquors, either inside the closure or within 40 rods. So, I guess I must be missing something here that is not apparent on the surface, because as I read this language, I don't get the same result that Senator Schellpeper has indicated.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Lamb. Senator Schellpeper.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Madam Chairman and members, I think if you'll...if Senator Lamb will look down just a little bit further, it says, except by licensees. If you have a license, you can do it. But what we're saying is that you can't be there
