PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Chizek. Does anyone wish to speak to the committee amendments? Seeing none, do you have closing, Senator Chizek? Closing is waived. We'll now vote on the committee amendments to LB 437. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on adoption of committee amendments.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Committee amendments are adopted. Do you have opening on the bill itself, Senator Chizek?

SENATOR CHIZEK: Madam President, I just...I explained basically the bill when I went over the amendment too, and as I had indicated, there will be another amendment that will further reduce that at the next level of debate. And I would just ask that we advance the bill.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Chizek. Is there anyone who wishes to speak to the bill itself? Seeing none, do you have closing? Closing is waived. We'll now vote on the motion to advance LB 437. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on the advancement of LB 437.

PRESIDENT MOUL: LB 437 is advanced. LB 764.

CLERK: LB 764 was a bill introduced by Senator Schellpeper. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 23 of 1991, referred to Urban Affairs Committee, advanced to General File. I have committee amendments pending by the Urban Affairs Committee, Madam President.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Madam Chairman, members of the body, what this does, it's really an election bill. What happened in our legislative session in 1987, a bill was heard, one bill, LB 587 was heard by the Urban Affairs Committee. Another bill, LB 652, was heard by the Government, Military and Veterans Affairs
