

out-of-state waste disposed of in Nebraska, but it's a fact of life and it will continue to happen and probably, in fact, escalate, as the landfills in the East Coast, the West Coast, begin to fill up and simply siting new landfills in those areas are going to become impossible, and dumping of garbage in the ocean is going to be restricted or stopped. A lot of that waste is starting...going to start moving inward and that is going to move to areas where there are available landfills, and I don't see that we are going to put anybody out of business by at least asking some minor requirements, minimum requirements for those who are transporting waste into our state. With that, I would like to move the committee amendments, please.

SPEAKER BAACK: You have heard Senator Rod Johnson's closing on the committee amendments. We will now vote on the committee amendments. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. We are voting on the committee amendments, have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 1 nay, Mr. President, on adoption of the committee amendments as offered by Natural Resources.

SPEAKER BAACK: The amendments are adopted. We will now proceed to the bill. Senator Morrissey on LB 406 as amended. Oh, excuse me, Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I appreciate being given the opportunity to finally speak on my bill. I would, and reluctantly I supported the committee amendments. You know, I am not sure that they are all that great and I am sure...I think I have some of the reservations that Senator Schmit has. However, I would also like to call your attention to the fact that this bill, when I first introduced it, started out as a \$55,000 bill. Then there was some more estimates that came in from the engineering company that has been retained for disposing of solid wastes, and what do you know, it went up to \$99,000 for the first year, but that is not the end of it, Senator Pirsch. The current estimate is on the order of \$250,000, and I don't think that is the end of it yet. In fact, Senator Morrissey, I think, has plans for this bill that he will, perhaps, and I have possibly no objection to the fact that he may want to add some more things to it as the solid waste plan goes toward completion, and that it may be much more expensive than it is now. The problem I have with these fiscal notes is that we don't have a good estimate from the department
