PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Does anyone wish to speak to this resolution? Seeing none...Senator Crosby.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Madam President, and good morning. Senator Chambers, I'm not going to say anything except thank you for bringing the resolution.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Crosby. Does anyone else wish to speak to the resolution? Do you have closing, Senator Chambers? Closing is waived. We will now vote on the motion to adopt LR 218. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 31 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on adoption of the resolution as offered by Senator Chambers.

PRESIDENT MOUL: LR 218 is adopted. We will now proceed with Item 8 on the agenda, adoption of the permanent rules. Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Madam President and members, the first recommendation for your consideration today as recommended by the Rules Committee has to do with remaining in your seats during Final Reading. As we all know, on Final Reading, it is possible for someone to offer to request that a bill be returned to Select File for an amendment. On some occasions, that's done simply to make a statement and usually when that happens whoever introduces the motion to return it from Final Reading to Select File for that purpose indicates it. And people know the difference and generally stay on the floor or close by the floor so they can vote. It's an important responsibility we all have to remain in our seats, not only because of the system and how it applies but because of the responsibility we have on Final
