When they can look around and see everybody in their seat or rest in the assurance that if they're not in their seat, they're only out in the corridor, or over in the senator's lounge, then they're comfortable and secure. What other people do and where they go is of no concern to me. If their view of being a senator allows them to be gone every day that we're in session, what is that to me? I don't vote for them. I don't pay their salary. They don't represent me or my interests. It's for them to make that determination. We have not stated, by rule, that persons who speak sometimes above what is considered a well-modulated level person, such as myself, and Bud Robinson, nobody has offered a rule to say that we have to speak quietly all the time, nor has Bud or myself attempted to offer a rule that requires these whispers to speak up. We don't do that because people have their own style of doing things. I think the rule, as it stands, should be left alone. Let us bear the consequences of our own conduct. If the Clerk has to issue a call for us to come to the floor to vote, what is the Clerk paid for? And I would like to ask Senator Beutler a question. Senator Beutler, let's say that the proposal that you are advocating is adopted and things have gotten very heated on the floor and a senator leaves the floor to go to his or her office and one of the Sergeants attempts to stop that person, how...how far is the Sergeant to go in stopping that person? Is there to be a physical touching by the Sergeant? Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Chambers, I certainly wouldn't recommend that a Sergeant physically touch.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would they then summon the State Trooper?

SENATOR BEUTLER: I am assuming that he would report back to the Clerk.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And then would the Clerk go after the person?

SENATOR BEUTLER: I assume that the Clerk would report to the Speaker.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And then would the Speaker go after the person?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: He's shaking his head negative.
