implementing the six process. And I think I would urge you to be supportive. In terms of what Senator Lamb has said about diversity representation on committees, I don't know, Senator Lamb, I really don't know of how many committees out there actually have two, two, two and two on the eight-member committees because we get involved in trades. We all know that. We will under this system. We will under a three system. We will trade around but it's a...but it's a way of beginning the process. The only other thing, I guess, I would say is there was another plan I saw floating around that had people in five caucuses which I thought was better than this one, but I understand the author of that one has, for whatever reason, has chosen not to put that one forward and I'm somewhat concerned by that because I thought that was coming forward. But, of the plans that are before you today, I really think that the six proposition would be one that would meet the needs of both people, primarily because you're going to be working with your neighbors. Currently, within the Omaha delegation, what's our problem in Omaha? Quite frankly, under the four system, two or three...two of our members currently, from the Omaha area, are peeled off of that and stuck into the Lincoln caucus where there is no commonality of interest. I think the proposal, although I haven't seen what...Senator Beutler has indicated he has a plan up there, I don't know what it is because there have been a number of fours floating around. Maybe it's been distributed but I haven't seen it. We're going to have a continuation of that. We're going to have more people from Omaha peeled out of our district and put down to make the numbers count down into the Lincoln area.

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR WITHEM: And I suppose that the Lincoln senators think it's important that they control their own caucus. That's...that's their ability and their right to put forward their own self-interest. But, hopefully, somewhere along the line we're going to, this session, not concern ourselves entirely with self-interest in regional parts of the state and get beyond that. I think what this does is it puts people together into the corps of groups that they can work with and I would urge you to support it.
