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Coordsen and Senator Byars. Okay, let's follow through then and see what happens to Senator Coordsen and Senator Byars. Senator Byars is then picked up in the 3rd District because Senator Peterson's district is no longer in the 3rd District. So Senator Byars replaces Senator Peterson. And Senator Coordsen moves over to the 4th District to replace Senator Schrock, whose district will no longer exist. So the 4th District remains the same except Senator Schrock is replaced by Senator Coordsen and then there is one last juggling effect that takes place in order to get the proper number of senators in each district and that is that Senator Nelson is switched from the 3rd District to the 4th District. So there are basically one, two, three, three sitting senators affected by this. That's the most minimal change we can get. And if somebody can come up with a better configuration, I, for one, am certainly willing to listen but I think this represents a very reasonable conclusion and adjustment to the redistricting changes that took place last year. And my final comment would be simply that let us not confuse the idea of one-person, one-vote. Let us keep clearly in mind what that means, and what that means is that the districts are as best we can evenly divided so that the same number of constituents are in each district. So there's nothing...there's nothing wrong with...there's nothing in violation of one-person, one-vote in having four districts. Now one can make the argument very reasonably that it represents a kind of gerrymandering and that argument will be made, I'm sure. You'll have to make your judgments on that. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Withem, followed by Senator Coordsen. Senator Withem.

SENATOR WITHEM: Yes, Senator Lynch has indicated, I think, that the handwriting is on the wall and we know what's going to happen but I would like to put some things in the record. And one of those things, Senator Beutler, you're just wrong and I don't know if you're wrong because you refuse to listen or you refuse to look or that you just don't understand. Simple mathematics, Senator Beutler, the Omaha area represents fully one-third of the population of the state, Sarpy County, Douglas County, together with a little bit of Plattsmouth is one-third of the population of the state. We went through that last year, one-third of the state. The Appropriations Committee of the Legislature, which makes decisions on where our tax money is going to be distributed, most important committee in the Legislature, that area of the state has two-ninths
