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be, yes. There's more good time given than there is now, depending upon the circumstances. Thank you, Senator Chambers.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Haberman. Senator Robinson. Senator Robinson.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Madam President, members of the body, I'd like to ask Senator Chambers a question.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR ROBINSON: What information do we have on people that are released from correctional institutions because of the good time as far as those people coming back to our correctional facilities? Is there any data on that?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, Senator Robinson, everybody gets good time, everybody.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Regardless of...but you don't get...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: When you go in you get it.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay, okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then if you commit infractions, you lose it.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Some have lost all of the good time that they have so they serve a longer period of time.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Yeah. But how about those that do not lose their good time? Is there a...what kind of a record is it?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Some stay out and some come back.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Excuse me?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Some stay out and some come back.

SENATOR ROBINSON: There's really no concrete evidence, though, saying that those that do not lose it in prisons or the correctional institutions are better risks when they're released then. Is that correct?
