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experience as a board member in Hastings certainly gives her a background in understanding how people are screened for any jobs having to do with schools, in elementary and secondary schools. So I will vote for the amendment to the amendment and hope that you will support the whole amendment when we get to it. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Crosby. Does anyone else wish to speak to the amendment? Senator Pirsch.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Thank you, Madam Chair. I would like to know from Senator Crosby, if she would yield, a question about this amendment.

SENATOR CROSBY: Okay, all right.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Senator Crosby, you handed out five amendments.

SENATOR CROSBY: Right.

SENATOR PIRSCH: As I understand, you plan to go through them one by one until the body adopts one. Was that your intent?

SENATOR CROSBY: One or all.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Okay. So if we then add this amendment to the first amendment and it is rejected, then you want to include it in all of the other five amendments?

SENATOR CROSBY: I will just keep going through the amendments, Senator Pirsch.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Can I ask you, which is your favorite amendment?

SENATOR CROSBY: I don't have any favorite because I think...

SENATOR PIRSCH: You don't have any favorite.

SENATOR CROSBY: ...I think that my amendments and what Senator Bohlke brought points up the idea that it's not a simple issue. It is a complex thing that we're looking at.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Okay. So with five amendments you perhaps thought that maybe some of them would not be acceptable.
