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rather than the income from the land. I hope you have questions.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Lamb. Now I'll recognize senators wishing to speak to the Lamb amendment. Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Madam Chairman, members of the body, I just don't know how to handle Senator Lamb getting up and crying and crying on the behalf of Sarpy County. You know that disturbs me just a little bit. But he didn't mention how much money Sarpy County gets from the taxes on that 261 acres, did he? He didn't say what their income was from the taxes on the 261 acres. He says it's unfair. Well, Senator Lamb, as soon as you get off the phone I'll ask you a question, but I can make some other remarks. Senator Lamb, what happens to the counties who are now receiving in lieu of tax funds? Do they receive as much or more?

SENATOR LAMB: Would you repeat that, Senator Haberman, I'm sorry.

SENATOR HABERMAN: The counties who are now receiving in lieu of taxes payments to the schools who have school land, do they receive as much or more money?

SENATOR LAMB: Than if, I assume you are saying if that land was on the tax rolls and...

SENATOR HABERMAN: That's correct, that's correct.

SENATOR LAMB: Yeah. Well...

SENATOR HABERMAN: Let's just say how much...yes or no? More or less?

SENATOR LAMB: It's close. You know some places it's more, some places it's less.

SENATOR HABERMAN: So it would average out that it would be about...

SENATOR LAMB: It's okay.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Oh, then I guess I...thank you, Senator Lamb.
