have a meaningful hearing. With that, Madam President, I would ask to have the rule suspended so we can cancel this hearing scheduled for next week.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Kristensen. Is there anyone who wishes to address this motion to suspend rules? Seeing none, we will proceed on the vote...to vote on the motion to suspend rules. I remind the senators, we must have 30 votes. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted on the motion to suspend the rules? Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 30 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on the motion to suspend the rules and cancel the public hearing.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The rules are suspended and the hearing is cancelled. I will now recognize the Speaker.

SPEAKER BAACK: Yes, Madam President and colleagues, just a brief announcement before we start on bills on General File. If you will notice, about two-thirds of the way down on the list of General File bills, LB 366 is listed, and 366A, that was an error, it should be 336 and 336A. LB 336 is a bill introduced by the Transportation Committee and Senator Cudaback, and it dealt with changing the minimum age for obtaining a drivers license. So that will...it will come up in the order that...instead of 366, it will be 336. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. We'll now proceed with General File. We'll start with LB 21.

CLERK: Madam President, LB 21 was a bill introduced by Senator Coordsen. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 10, 1991. At that time it was referred to Natural Resources Committee. The bill was advanced to General File. There were committee amendments pending. Madam President, the bill was discussed on February 8, again on February 11. There was a motion on February 14 adopted regarding the bracketing of LB 21 until January 1, 1992. I have pending the committee amendments, as well as an amendment to the committee amendments.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Recognize Senator Rod Johnson.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: Thank you, Madam President, members of the Legislature. LB 21, as originally introduced, would have
