SPEAKER BAACK: Okay, we will now proceed to LB 201.

CLERK: Mr. President, 201 was a bill introduced by Senators Rod Johnson, Smith, Will, Rogers, Hartnett, Cudaback and Rasmussen. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 11 of last year. At that time, it was referred to General Affairs Committee. The bill was advanced to General File. I do have committee amendments pending by the General Affairs Committee.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Senator Schellpeper, on the committee amendments.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Thank you, Mr. Chairman and members. The committee amendments make two policy statements. The first statement is that the tribal-state agreements, they promote tribal economic development and tribal self-sufficiency and strong tribal government. And, second, that all activities that are...that are going to be conducted on tribal lands that are going to be pursuant to a compact include only those activities that are going to be permitted in Nebraska. Only activities that are going to be permitted in Nebraska are the only ones that the committee amendments are going to cover. So, with that, I move the committee amendments. Thank you.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Thank you, Senator Schellpeper. You heard Senator Schellpeper's explanation of the committee amendments. Would one care to speak to the committee amendments?
