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because I think you may have more information on this than I do. I really don't know the answer to this. If a person with a liquor license sells liquor to a minor, what is the penalty for a first offense of selling liquor to a minor in an establishment of the kind we're talking about?

SENATOR HEFNER: Senator Chambers, I don't know, but I understand it's pretty severe.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Hefner, are you aware that tobacco kills more people than alcohol?

SENATOR HEFNER: Yes, I am. I...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then let me ask you this question, why should there be a harsher punishment then for serving liquor to minors, when that doesn't cause as much damage, a lesser...a harsher punishment for that than for making alcohol...I mean tobacco available to them?

SENATOR HEFNER: Senator Chambers, you have a good thought there. And, by the way, yesterday when we heard two Clarkson Hospital bills, why you informed us how many died from cigarettes and tobacco versus how many died from using too much liquor or other drugs.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So why should we have a harsher punishment for that which causes the lesser damage?

SENATOR HEFNER: I can't answer that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think that we would be more logical if we were going to scale punishments based on the harm caused by the conduct, to have a harsher punishment for a more damaging conduct? Isn't that logical?

SENATOR HEFNER: Well, I would say in a way it is, but I...I...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What should I get the harshest punishment for, hitting you on the head with a hammer, or shooting you with a spit ball? Which should carry the harshest punishment?

SENATOR HEFNER: They'd both be pretty tough.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, thank you, Senator Hefner. Some people
